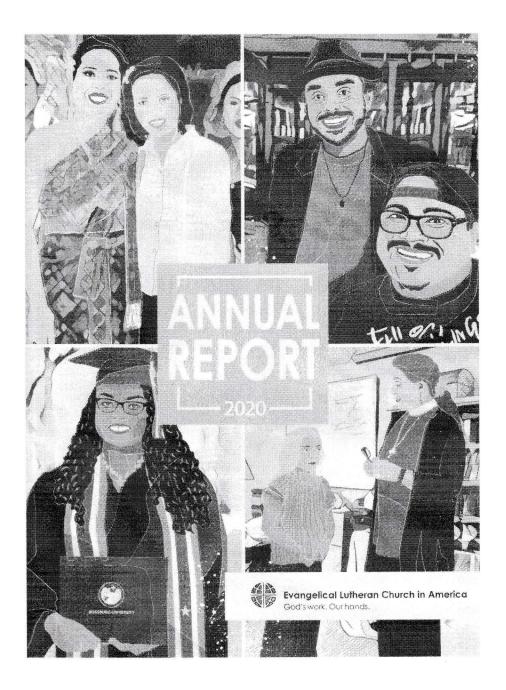

Hello Everyone,

This has been a different kind of year. We began the year by welcoming Liz Sigdestad to our staff as the new secretary. We also made it down to St. Dysmas so we could worship with the inmates on a snowy day. I believe we did not have to cancel anything in January due to weather, yeah! February rolled in bringing with it a blizzard but other than canceling Confirmation and Wednesday School one day the rest of the month was good. We even celebrated First Communion for five people. Then came March and with it Covid-19 and everything changed. Schools canceled classes and moved to on-line learning. SunDial began to restrict visitors even stopping visitation all together and we moved worship from in the sanctuary to gathering on-line. Zoom became the program of choice for any type of meeting, not my favorite way to communicate. We adopted, I began to learn and experiment with different ways of bringing worship to you. Thank you for your grace as it took a little bit to settle on FaceBook Live. I tell you, trying to record ahead of time to include powerpoint slides in order for us to have words to hymns and then editing everything to look good took way too much time and hair pulling as I tried to figure all that out.

Some how we survived and I settled on a simple worship using the same bulletin every week to help us settle into a pattern of worship that was both familiar and easy to follow. It worked and the most surprising thing was that the we began to reach people who lived far from Bristol, the Holy Spirit works in mysterious ways. This on-line ministry is something we plan on continuing. We were able to record our services and post them on our website so those who did not have Facebook could attend worship also. Eventually I created a Youtube page, BethesdaButler, where all of our services and children's sermons are archived. At some point in May I came to the realization that I needed to include a message for the kids and decided to have a separate time just for them. Wednesday was the day I chose and by doing this message separately I was able to be more creative as a way to engage with them. I have had fun with these messages and I hope you enjoyed them also.

We attempted to come together for worship in the sanctuary a couple of times throughout the summer but every time Covid-19 reared it's ugly head. Eventually we did begin meeting in the sanctuary while at the same time livestreaming our services. This brought new opportunities for us to overcome as we wanted people to see and hear the worship service. We bought some new equipment which has worked out well. Bethesda purchased a camera and then a tablet needed to run the camera and the picture and sound are much improved from just using my Ipad. Butler has installed internet service for the purpose of maintaining a better worship experience for those joining us via livestream.

Covid-19 has certainly affected how we do things. Now when we gather for worship we sit apart from each other, we wear masks, we don't sing and we don't gather in fellowship after the service. It has also affected how we say good bye to members of our communities. Funerals are now for family members only and we no longer serve a meal. Things will change by July or August we should have been offered a chance to b vaccinated and at that point some of our precautions will drop but we will still continue to have an on-line presence with our worship services and children's sermons.

This year I have presided over: 5 First Communions; 1 Confirmation; 6 Funerals; I continued to conduct a service at SunDial as often as I was allowed. I also visited with and brought communion to various members in their homes. I finished my term on the Synod council in May and attended many zoom meetings with colleagues around the synod.

BETHESDA LUTHERAN CHURCH January 26, 2020 Annual Meeting

Following a 9 a.m. joint service with Butler, the 131st Annual Meeting of Bethesda Lutheran Church was called to order by President Kyle Hubsch. Pastor Chris Strohm led the 22 members in prayer, asking God's blessings and guidance on our meeting.

REPORTS:

PASTOR opened with his review of his 5th year as our Pastor. He described his multiple commitments to our Church, our Community and the Synod and expressed how blessed he feels to be our Pastor. We in turn showed him our love and thanks with a round of applause!

PRESIDENT: Kyle thanked everyone for the smooth 2 years he has had serving as our President. He reviewed the pattern of giving report and 2020 budget with us and after discussion, a motion and second was offered by Pam Williamson and Gayle Horter to approve the budget. Motion carried.

SECRETARY'S REPORT: The minutes from the 2020 meeting were reviewed. It was moved by Jim Peterson and seconded by Fran Morehouse to approve the secretary's report. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Jill presented her report, giving a big thanks to everyone who gave additional money at the end of the year to help with expenses. She told us we are currently spending \$5,000 more a year than we are taking in. We were encouraged to review our Thrivent designations, as Choice Dollars are very significant in meeting the budget. The Giving Tree is being used to pay designated expenses and should be over and above our regular donations. We have asked Butler to contribute more. We asked for 50/50 and they countered with 55/45. Jill also encouraged any Thrivent members to consider doing a benevolence project. They will pay \$250 toward an approve the Treasurer's Report. Motion carried. President Kyle asked for a round of applause for all the hard work Jill does to keep the Church's finances running smoothly.

SPECIAL FUNDS, WELCA, LUTHER LEAGUE & SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORTS: The reports were reviewed, with little discussion. After a motion and second by Alice Jean Peterson and Jane Goehring, the reports were approved.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: The proposed slate of officers as shown in this Annual Report was presented by the nominating committee. The Vice President position remains open. Kyle asked if there were any volunteers, which was met with silence. The position will remain vacant for the year. A thanks and motion to approve was offered by Kathryn Bury and seconded by Fran Morehouse. Motion carried.

LENTEN SERVICES were discussed. Where should we send our share of the offering? It was reported that the Webster food pantry and PACH program weren't in need of donations at this time. After discussion, Bonnie Dolney moved that we divide the offerings between the Langford and Groton BAGS programs. George Dolney seconded the motion, which carried.

Kyle asked for any questions, comments or discussion regarding the coming year. The question was raised if it would save money to hold services in the basement. The consensus was to continue meeting upstairs, but if the winter turned very cold and stormy, that option would be considered. He again thanked everyone for their attendance and wanted to especially thank Kay Espeland for her above and beyond service to the Church. We closed with applause for Kay and Kyle.

We prayed the Lord's Prayer and left the meeting with optimism for the coming year.

Fiscal Year 2020 Report for the Bethesda Lutheran Church Endowment Fund

At the January 2018 annual meeting of the church, the endowment fund was discussed. Per that discussion, at the March 2018 maturity of one of the CDs, the endowment committee combined the 2 Certificates of Deposit, along with the balance that was in Special Funds for the endowment fund, into a single certificate of deposit at First Savings Bank, Bristol, SD. The CD term is 5 years at a 1.75% interest rate. The maturity date is Mar. 27, 2023.

Dear Siblings in Christ of the South Dakota Synod,

Grace and peace to you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit!

"But we had hoped" – is probably the most used phrase of 2020. However, this is also the phrase of the two disciples walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus after Christ's death and resurrection. While on the road wrestling with things

that they cannot understand, Jesus joins them on the road, sharing with them how all of these things rested in God all along. It is not until the breaking of the bread that the holy heartburn the two disciples felt all along propels them to run back to their friends to share that Christ truly is alive and not dead, and that therefore his followers need to live into the promise that they too are alive and that death has lost its power.

I cannot help but come to understand that this story is our story. It has always been our story, but 2020 has brought this story alive for me in new and profound ways. We too have found ourselves saying countless times this year, "but we had hoped." We too wrestled with the hard questions about what to make of the events of this past year as they unfolded in our life. We have wished many times to go "back to normal." As I heard from people, I invited them to expound on what going back to normal means to them. Creating this space allowed for a deeper reflection on who we are as people of God in South Dakota. Jesus accompanied the disciples on the road and shared scripture with them to open their eyes to God's continued provision and presence in the world. Even in the midst of these life-altering and events of Christ's death and resurrection God is alive and at work. My staff and I have accompanied your community of faith during this life-altering pandemic assuring you that God's Holy Spirit is inspiring and sustaining.

Early on, we hosted weekly Zoom meetings for rostered and lay leaders. We continue these meetings on a monthly basis. Task forces were created to provide resources and training for congregations to continue ministry, such as "Canvas" an online resource platform and network for everything educational. Two worship documents and guidance were created: "Extending the Table, Expanding Participation" and "Come Let us Worship in a New Way." I can say that the pandemic and the challenges of living into a new way of being church has created some heartburn. Many may not call it a holy heartburn, but remember neither did the disciples until they sat at the table with Jesus and ate. Only when bread was broken, and wine was poured, did they remember the promises that God's got them and that they have nothing to fear. I pray that you too will come to recognize and interpret your heartburn as *holy heartburn* that empowers you to <u>be church</u> in a new and different way for the sake of the Gospel.

Thank you for your continued support and partnership. Now, as we move forward, let's commit ourselves to journey together in Christ, and in Christ alone.

The 2021 mission plan for the synod was discussed and proposed by the Synod Council in the absence of the Synod Assembly being able to convene and pass a mission plan during 2021. The mission plan is reflective of the Synod Council's hopes for how we, as the church, will be able to support and engage in ministry together, while recognizing the unusual uncertainty which began in 2020 and may continue in 2021. Accordingly, the Synod Council proposed a flat budget based upon the congregational statements of intended mission support for the 2020 mission plan year. No significant changes from the 2020 mission plan were proposed other than prudently planning to reduce meeting and leadership realted expenses in order to propose a balanced 2021 mission plan.

In 2019, we listened to you and learned from you in order for us to care for you as the body of Christ in South Dakota. As we live into the realities of the COVID-19 pandemic, many things that were said in 2019 are ever more present.

- **18 leaders** were trained as Peer Mentor Facilitators, creating four Peer Mentor Groups for our first call leaders to mutually support one another.
- The synod's **Coaching Network** expanded, with a new cohort of coaches and further training options for existing coaches.
- Congregations and the synod were able to begin or expand digital worship, allowing us to proclaim the Gospel in a new way, and often reach new people.
- The synod is investing resources into Canvas, a digital teaching platform to help Christian Education be reformed in the midst of the pandemic.
- We started the **Justice Table**, a group of people committed to confronting racism in South Dakota, which will focus on Education, Advocacy, and Community Organizing.
- Journeying Together in Christ, the synod's strategic vision plan, was created and rolled out after conversations with people across the synod.
- A Worship Task Force was created, which published guidelines and suggestions for worship during the pandemic.
- Despite cancelling Synod Assembly, we gathered digitally this Fall via the Synod Day event, and still celebrated our work together through speakers and worship.
- A Faith Formation task force was created to navigate options for congregations in different situations in the pandemic.
- We received numerous grants from our Lutheran partner organizations, including from the ELCA Domestic Mission Unit, Lutheran Disaster Response, ELCA COVID Relief Fund, as well as numerous outside organizations.
- The **Storyteller Network** was launched as a group of people committed to telling ministry stories of what the Holy Spirit is up to in South Dakota through our ministries.

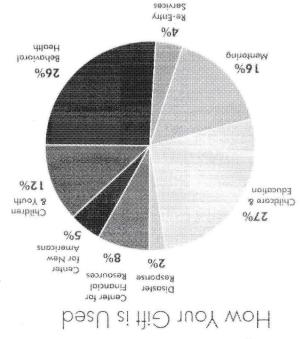
