

A recent news program reported that we wear each piece of our clothing an average of 7 times. (No doubt we all have something hanging in our closets with the tag still attached.) Think of the gadgets and gizmos aplenty for newborns today, and then ponder Baby Jesus born in a manger with next to nothing. Confusing "need" with "want" is easily done in our times, especially when there are endless ads for ways to make our lives easier or completion of a task faster. Guilty!

While money can't buy happiness, it can provide a meal, a coat, heat, a simple Christmas sack, shelter in a safe place, gifts the impoverished, imprisoned, and homeless count as luxuries. Any gift, no matter how big or small, makes a difference to someone in need.

We can love, appreciate, and celebrate those special people in our lives with our presence, our time, our help, compliments, hugs, "I love you", and handwritten notes. Perhaps the material gift could be paid forward to someone that is waiting for a much-needed blessing.

When it comes to Christmas and kiddos, there is an unadulterated joy in watching them open their gifts. Good advice to follow is something to wear, something they need, something they want, and something to read. The wearing and the needing item usually are combined for my grandson. Again, it is not the size or expense of the gift. Joy is found in a mini-monster truck as much as the motorized model to drive around the yard.

I would like to begin by extending a heartfelt 'thank you' to you. Your generosity has allowed a group of five individuals to be guests in our companion synod in Cameroon. The EELC celebrated its centennial this year. What began as the "Sudan Mission" a hundred years ago are now two church bodies, one in Cameroon and one in the Central African Republic.

Please, know that the group would be delighted if your congregation would like to hear about the rich ministry that happens in the EELC as well as how we can partner and learn from each other. Feel free to reach out to Rev. Dr. Aaron Matson in the synod office to schedule any one of the group members to share in conversation with your context.

One of the many treasured memories I bring home with me is the deep and abiding joyful almost childlike faith I came to experience in the church in Cameroon. The untamed dancing and singing from memory were contagious, even for an introvert like me. Throughout my entire time in Cameroon, I was reminded that when we entertain and welcome the stranger, we might just as well entertain angels and God's provision is written all over our lives, if we open our eyes and hearts to the possibilities.

Finally, please, know that I recognize that times for many faith communities are challenging, but hear the affirmation that in the midst of our challenges are opportunities for God to shine and work among us in mighty ways. I invite you to trust the first line of the Apostle's Creed that "I believe in God the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth." No matter how hard times will get, God will not forsake or forget us. That's a promise we can respond to with great joy.

FYI: Updates to the Call Process Webpage

If you have been to the Call Process page on the SD Synod Website this fall, you may have noticed a change. In the past we have had the "Congregations in Transition" section immediately accessible. This portion of the page is still viewable, but now password protected. If you would like to see the "Congregations in Transition" section, simply visit www.sdsynod.org, click on the upper right-hand corner of the webpage that says "call process." Once on the page, scroll down to the bottom and vou will see this line:

"To receive the password to view the page, please fill out this form."

Click on "this form" and it will take you to a **short** form. After filling the form, you will receive a password that will give you access to the "Congregations in Transition" that will remain the same until the password changes (about once every 3 months). When it changes, simply fill out the form again and receive the new password to access the page, which is updated weekly.

Please continue to pray for and remember our congregations in transition.

I am writing this very early this morning, October 26, 2023. I was awoken early with a message from our daughter that said, "we are safe, no school, sheltering in place." I immediately went to a news source and found out the mass shooting in Maine was in a neighboring town to where our daughter and her family live. Needless to say, my sleep was over for the night. My heart and prayers go out to the families that find themselves in a place they never wanted to be, but I know that Jesus is with them.

As saddened as I am from this senseless shooting, there is something just as senseless going on in this country and yet it's only mentioned in small town papers obituary section. I am referring to the large I am referring to the large number of farm suicides. In the USA, two farmers die by suicide every day! Think about that for a moment and let that sink in, two farmers die by suicide every day! Now take a look at the churches you worship in and ask yourselves, are any of the people gathered here this morning headed that direction? Staggering thought, isn't it?

I invite you to be aware of the people in the pews and let them know that they are not alone in their struggles and that help is available. With the rising costs of farm inputs that I am hearing about for next year, we may find ourselves and our congregations caught up in this statistic. Please provide resources for everyone, such as the 988 the national suicide hotline and also local resources. Our farmers and ranchers need to know that we as the brothers and sisters of Christ care about them and want them around! The Synod staff have resources too and are walking with you.

Cameroon Fun Facts

(shared by Bishop Constanze)

*Rice is eaten often, imported from China.

*The seminary owns 3 computers and gets 4 days of electricity. The computers are shared between 70 students and staff.

*Special fabric is designed for any special church event. This is a limited print, and Bishop was gifted with a generous amount of this to bring home.

*Huge growth is taking place in the church in Cameroon.

*It is custom to greet visitors by laying down fabric and dancing. The bishop was asked to introduce her "entourage" most places she went.

*No new literature has been added to their library since 2006. This was previously funded by the Lutheran World Federation and is no longer.

*They are working to update and inform what items should/shouldn't be sent that are useful. They do not want anything sent that can be purchased locally. They often receive medical equipment that does not work.

*The language of Cameroon is French, Fulani, and English.

*Close to \$52,000 was raised for the roof project with each roof costing about \$8,000.
