Bethesda Church Council News: Bats

Over the past several years and probably a lot longer than any of us even know Bethesda has been having problems with bats in the church. In February Olson Pest Technicians from Yankton did an inspection. They discovered multiple access points in flashing/facia boards that are separating from the brick that allow the bats access into the church interior. After reviewing options the council voted April 7th to hire Olson Pest Technicians. They will seal the space between the facia board and brick using expandable black foam, leave the bats an exit and do multiple inspections to insure all the bats are out of the church building. They include a 2 year guarantee on the sealant work. Their services come at a cost of \$6,850 plus tax. If you would like to give a donation towards this project you may mail it to the church (PO Box 426 Bristol, SD) or place it in the offering plate on Sunday with BATS in the memo line of your check. Grace and Peace in the name of the RISEN CHRIST! - As I am writing my May greetings to you I am looking outside the window, watching the rain fall. And, I give thanks for God's nourishing waters unto the parched land. Thanks be to God! Every year this time I pray for those who are called to steward the land and livestock that will bring nourishment to our tables. How long has it been that you gathered with those you love around a table for an in person meal? Many of us long to be together in person, especially in worship and fellowship. The CDC released new guidelines, which allow for small group gatherings, but caution us yet to gather in large groups especially without any safety measures or protection. I have released new recommendations concerning in person gatherings.

Keep an eye out for resources from the synod for your congregation as you have these discussions. We will provide some conversation suggestions for working on community grief, discernment, and other places we need to pay attention to our ministry. We are planning a retreat for lay leaders and rostered leaders to ask tough questions and reflect on where they are, and where God hopes them to be. We are putting together relationships so that you don't do this work alone.

If this work of finding a new way of being the church is exciting for you, please be in touch with me, and keep your eyes and ears (and email inboxes!) open for the next steps to take. Know that the Holy Spirit is at work, and God is up to incredible things through your church.

Seek the Welfare

"But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare." (Jeremiah 29.7)

These words from Scripture were lifted up by the Rev. Dr. Rolf Jacobson at the Spring Theological Event in April. The theme for the 3-day, on-line event was: Prophetic Words of Hope. God's people are always in need of hearing prophetic words of hope, which often come to us through poetry and song. Think of the Psalms and the Word of God spoken through the prophets!

People are wondering what ministry and worship look and feel like post-pandemic. For many, the last year has felt like the wilderness or even exile. I just saw a Facebook post of a friend who wrote: "Last night I hugged my first human in over thirteen months."

The words of Jeremiah come to the people of God who are in exile. They long for what was, and do not know what the future holds. It is in this state of grief and uncertainty that God asks the people to not fight their way home, or huddle together in fear, but rather to seek the welfare of the city. Keep in mind, this is the city of the ones who conquered Jerusalem. Not only are God's people to seek the welfare of the new city in which they didn't ask to be in, but they are to also "pray to the Lord on its behalf." What?!

The prophet then adds: "for in its welfare you will find your welfare."

This hopeful way of being made me wonder about all of our churches and cities throughout the SD Synod. What if in all circumstances we find ourselves, we seek the welfare of where we live? This requires us to think about abundance rather than scarcity, to go out into our communities rather than who we can get into our pews, and to trust that God is bringing new life and healing to all circumstances.

Pr. Jacobson planted seeds for thought at the Spring Theological Event. He said:

"Invite people to write poetry on hopes and hurts in the community so people can join them in ministry and blessing."

"How would you bestow hope as a congregation to your community and the world through your generosity and a proclamation of hope?"

And here are some additional questions to ponder in all of our communities of faith as we live into this Easter season: What is the nature of where God has planted your congregation? How is God blessing your community? What are the hopes and hurts of the people in and around your community? How does your mission and ministry connect with these hopes and hurts? What possibilities are out there that haven't yet been tried?

"But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare." (Jeremiah 29.7)

Perhaps you'd like to divide your gift amongst several different ministries, but your insurance company doesn't allow multiple beneficiaries. Lutheran Planned Generosity can work with you to create a distribution agreement that permits up to ten (10) charitable organizations to benefit from your generosity or establish an endowment in honor of your family, all while meeting the company requirements.

Organizations applying for an ELCA grant for the first time must register by setting up an account in ELCA GrantMaker in order to access the Domestic Hunger Grant application once it opens on April 19, 2021. Has your organization already registered in ELCA GrantMaker? Now is a great time to log back in and confirm that the contact information in your account is up to date.

Application Timeline Registration open: March 17–May 5, 2021

NOTE: Applicants must be registered in ELCA GrantMaker to access the application. Allow up to two weeks for registration approval. If you have not registered by May 5, you will not be able to start a new application. If you have already registered in ELCA GrantMaker, you do not need to register again.

Application open: April 19–May 21, 2021 Application review: June 2021–October 2021

Final awards approved and announced: February 2022
