A homemade cookie....a new pair of shoes....being served a meal while sitting at a table....having access to drinking water on an extremely hot day....having a roof over your head when the weather turns cold. What do all of these things have in common? These are all luxuries if you are homeless or housing insecure.

...And whoever gives even a cup of water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple – truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward. (Matthew 10:42)

I was humbled to share in two experiences with Pastor Chris Matson and Church on the Street this past month. Through our own COTS project, I was able to deliver 25 backpacks, 45 teen boy kits, 45 teen girl kits, and 25 snack kits. Pastor Chris and I took to the streets of Sioux Falls the afternoon of August 30th with loaded backpacks of the snack kits. We parked at The Banquet and set out on foot to cover several blocks where the homeless reside. Our first two encounters were with small groups living in vehicles. Many recognize Pastor Chris, and if they don't they ask, "Are you those church people?"

"Indeed we are! And we are here today to check on you and offer a snack."

Others we stopped on the street as Pastor Chris knows her people. We stopped at the rear of the Union Gospel Mission to visit with three men. Rodney was eager to tell me his story of growing up learning farming and anxious to be a farmer, but when his grandpa passed away his grandma decided to sell the land. Plan B was the military as all of his uncles had served. However, one uncle convinced his mother not to sign, stating it would turn Rodney into an alcoholic. Feeling abandoned by his family and having his plans thwarted twice, Rodney set out to prove his uncle right and became an alcoholic and fell in with the wrong crowd and spent some time in prison. However, he looked me in the eye with great conviction and told of his grandmother who had the strongest faith he'd ever seen and stated he knows God has a plan for him, but it is surely hard to wait some days and see what it will be.

Mark wasn't as eager to talk but told me he had walked down to Crossroads, the Christian bookstore on 41st Street, that morning before it got too hot to look at all the beautiful books and Bibles. Keep in mind, we were currently on 8th Street. Mark has yo-yoed back and forth between the Rapid City and Sioux Falls area, hoping to catch a break. He talked of the difficulty in securing a deposit as well as a month's rent for a place to live. And then throw in the issue of lack of affordable housing. Mark was also feeling distanced from his church as he felt they were focusing on all things worldly.

Our next stop was Heritage Park where several individuals, couples, and small groups were resting in the heat. Everyone was grateful and appreciative of the snack bags we distributed.

My regret was that we were not able to carry water with us also. Bishop Dudley House sets coolers of water out front each day, but for some this is several blocks away.

Backpacks emptied, we returned to the vehicle and proceeded to drive outside city limits to deliver a \$10 Hyvee card. (COTS has a benefactor every month that purchases 20, \$10 Hyvee cards to distribute at their discretion.) This group of three, a couple and a brother, were living in campers and had a working van to get to the grocery store. Two of the group were formerly convicted child molesters, and I found my temper and judgmental side flaring as we approached. Then I reminded myself they were also children of God, and it is God's wish to see every one of his children redeemed. I also commented that \$10 doesn't buy much these days, but Pastor Chris said people are very astute about purchasing protein items that leave them feeling fuller longer.

"If anyone says, 'I love God,' and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen." (I John 4:20)

My second COTS experience was worship in the park on September 9th. The Luther League donated 200 bottles of water and 20 dozen cookies for this event, so I wanted to help serve the meal. Setting up donations is a part of every COTS worship service. These are tables that people can shop before and after the church service. Some companies donate small amounts of new clothing items and shoes. There are boxes of new socks and Bibles. Journey of Hope distributes toiletry bags. Three new pairs of shoes were donated that day, and one of the recipients came up to me and exclaimed, "Look at the shoes I got! They are still in the box! I can't remember the last time I had a new pair of shoes!" Paperback books are also a luxury as people without an address or contact number can't get a library card. There were piles of secondhand sweatshirts and hoodies available for the cooler fall evenings. Sleeping mats and blankets were among the favorite items.

Worshippers sat in camper chairs that COTS uses for all outdoor services. (May - October) Bryan and I were put on hotdog duty (wrapping them to stay warm) and distributing cookies. There were about 150 people served. Pastor Allie, formerly of American Lutheran in Webster, leads the Peace Lutheran partnership with COTS. Their group distributes snack bags every month at the church service. I walked around with the extra cookies and encouraged seconds! It was also school picture day, so children had an opportunity for school pictures at no cost. Church on the Street thinks of everything. Birthdays are recognized monthly during the worship service and a hygiene kit wrapped in a new towel is gifted.

I know I have included a lot of details from my experiences, but it is in these very details that I find my gratitude blooming for the blessings I take for granted, blessings I don't have to struggle every day to accomplish or obtain to simply live.

SYNOD COUNCIL RETREAT

I am learning exponentially being part of Synod Council and am continually amazed at the number of projects and partnerships the Synod supports. Our August retreat was at the Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center for two nights. Pastor Dan Johnson is the director and has the help of three dedicated staff, Tony, Henry, and Abram. Each staff member has their specialty area. Led by Henry, Kids' Time is the main activity at the center, but they also operate a homeless shelter as needed. Abram has a heart for the homeless he serves. Summer is immersion season for guests. This year there was a visiting Chinese and Korean group, and the Kids' Time program was able to experience these cultures, including food. The Kids' Time program is always in need of art supplies and snacks. Shoes and Walmart or McDonalds gift cards are also needed. Kids' Time is available to children as soon as they are potty-trained and works with them through young adulthood. Adequate housing is a serious problem with 4,000 people waiting. Tony placed 66 families in the past year. Monetary donations can be specified for diapers, fuel assistance, or items listed above.

February 21, 28 & March 6, 13, & 20 are Lenten Service Weeks. **The week of March 27th is Holy Week and there will be no class**. Currently we have 27 children enrolled in our program and 11 confirmation class students each week. The meal should be enough to feed 40. Water will be furnished for drink and also all paper products and silverware will be furnished. Some ideas for meals would be, BBQ's, pizza, hot dogs, chips, sandwiches, walking tacos, hotdish, etc. You are responsible for serving kids, and cleanup. There is no set schedule for volunteers and there won't always be extra help in kitchen. Meal should be ready by 5:00-5:10 PM.

If you are not able to serve on the week you are scheduled, please find someone to switch with.
